Martin Bell was a reporter with the British Broadcasting Corporation for more than 30 years. He covered eleven different wars from Vietnam to Bosnia, and was twice chosen as BBC's "Reporter of the Year."

Barbara Crossette was the New York Times chief correspondent in Southeast Asia and later in South Asia. She reported on the Timorese battle for independence in the 1980s and has written about the Sri Lankan civil war.

Corey Fintoff is a newscaster for National Public Radio and has served as NPR's correspondent in Baghdad. In 1989 he won a Corporation for Public Broadcasting Award for his coverage of the Exxon Valdez oil spill.

Judith Lichtenberg is Professor of Philosophy and Research Scholar at the Institute for Philosophy and Public Policy. University of Maryland. She is a former board member of the Poynter Institute.

Albert Pierce is Professor of Ethics and National Security at the National Defense University in Washington, D.C. Previously he was Director of the Center for the Study of Professional Military Ethics at the U.S. Naval Academy.

Joel H. Rosenthal is president of the Carnegie Council on Ethics and International Affairs, and general editor of the scholarly journal Ethics and International Affairs.

Philip Seib is Lucius W. Nieman Professor of Journalism at Marquette University and co-editor of the journal Media, War, and Conflict.

Norman Solomon is founder and Executive Director of the Institute for Public Accuracy, author of a weekly syndicated column "Media Beat," and author of War Made Easy.

Bryan G. Whitman is Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. He is a senior spokesman for the Defense Department and oversees all media functions for the Pentagon's Press Office.
